

Girl Scouts ready to race

bout 130 Girl Scouts across 24 troops in Scripps Ranch will be competing in the Powder Puff Derby with their pinewood cars on March 1 at Dingeman Elementary School.

"The Powder Puff Derby has been around for several decades. It was a competition started by the Boy Scouts (Pinewood Derby). ... It's an event that is unique to scouting," Scripps Ranch 2025 Powder Puff derby co-chair Eric Caballero said. "I have two daughters who are Girl Scouts. This will be our fourth year competing in the event with my older daughter, and my youngest daughter's first year competing."

The pinewood cars are constructed from a kit. The kits are made and produced by the Boy Scouts of America.

"We purchase the kits from the Boy Scouts, and then distribute them to troops that want to participate. The kits are about \$15 each," Cabal-

lero said.

Each kit only includes a 2-inch by 6-inch piece of pinewood, four nails and four wheels.

"It is up to each scout to design and produce their own car to race down the track," Caballero said. "Some of the scouts will look up videos online on platforms like You-Tube to figure out how to make the fastest car. My daughter has watched videos each year to try to maximize the car's speed."

The scouts are able to produce their cars with the help of families in Scripps Ranch.

"The O'Days, who had children in Girl Scout troops within Scripps Ranch, ran the derby for the past seven years. This is the first year that they have not run it," Caballero said. "Their garage has been set up for producing a pinewood car. Even though they are not running the derby this year, they still have volunteered their garage."

• Second, create defensible space around your home.

Defensible space acts as a protective barrier, slowing or stopping the spread of wildfire while providing a safer environment for firefighters. Take these steps: Work with your neighbors to clear brush and maintain fire-resistant landscaping. Request a free defensible space inspection from Cal Fire: fire.ca.gov/dspace.

• Third, practice fire-safe habits. Properly dispose of smoking materials. Maintain vehicles to prevent sparks from exhaust. Mow before 10 a.m. and never on hot or windy days. Use string trimmers instead of lawnmowers to clear dry vegetation.

Library parking update

Parking at the Scripps Miramar Ranch Library continues to be a challenge, but there is now finally some progress to report.

Work on the parking lot expansion project is expected to resume in the spring. The contractor is working with the City to obtain permit approval for the large retaining wall that is planned, as the enlarged lot will expand into the adjacent canyon. There are other active projects that will make use of this space while the library parking expansion is on hold. The Miramar Gate valve replacement is under way. Also directly affecting our library, the long-awaited fire suppression system replacement project is expected to begin in February or March, and the very much needed library roof and HVAC replacement is anticipated to begin in May or June.

"The Hope Blooms luncheons are a great way to support survivors and make a difference at such a critical time in their lives. Each year I am reminded how proud I am to be a part of our amazing Scripps Ranch community," said HVH Auxiliary member Dora Rowe.

Those not able to attend the fundraiser may consider a donation to Hidden Valley House Auxiliary, or purchase items needed on the organization's Amazon Wish List, or join the Auxiliary.

HVH is operated by the Center for Community Solutions, a San Diego-based nonprofit organization dedicated to ending relationship and sexual violence. Since 1969, residents of HVH have received trauma-informed, wrap-around services to empower survivors as they heal and recover from trauma. These services include a 24/7confidential crisis hotline, four domestic violence shelters, counseling, legal services, safety planning, prevention education and more.

The mission of the Scripps Ranch HVH Auxiliary group is: "We Help So Survivors Can Heal." The organization looks for ways to make life easier for the HVH residents. This includes purchasing groceries for the community kitchen where parents can prepare meals for their children; providing a Welcome Bag filled with full-size toiletries for each adult, child and baby; shopping for linens or special baby formula or providing Valentines for the children to pass out to their

classmates. Survivors and their families may stay at the shelter for about six weeks. The residences get a lot of wear and tear, so the Auxiliary began renovating areas of the shelter to make it more welcoming for survivors. The Auxiliary painted the laundry room, replaced the dishwasher and range in the community kitchen, and in 2024, began tackling two of the resident units where families stay with fresh paint, a renovated bathroom and themed artwork. There is still more work to do.

SRWC General Scholarship

This year, the SRWC Scholarship Committee is being led by our two co-chairs, Jeanette Bossi and Annette Stewart. According to Jeanette, "The Scripps Ranch Women's Club is honored to award annual scholarships to deserving young women from our community. We are continually inspired by the talent and

ambition of Scripps Ranch students and are proud to support their journey as they embark on college and the next exciting chapter of their lives."

The application process is open to female seniors at Scripps Ranch High School who have a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher. The criteria also include demonstrating meaningful personal contributions to the community and active involvement in school organizations or community service. A completed application package includes the SRWC Scholarship Application, a high school transcript, one

letter of recommendation related to the candidate's community service, and a personal essay (up to two pages) discussing their unique attributes, achievements, goals and future career objectives.

The Scripps Ranch Women's Club website at srwomensclub.org/our-community-support provides specific eligibility requirements as well as on-line forms, including an electronic application. The Scripps Ranch High School Counselling Office also provides another source for eligibility information and applications.

Kimbra Sellers Business Scholarship

The Women's Club also offers the Kimbra Sellers Business Scholarship, created in honor of one of our past presidents. In tribute to Kimbra, her husband, Brian Sampson, has established a \$1,000 scholarship for the fifth consecutive year, which will be awarded to a senior female student planning to pursue a career in a business-related field.

their cars.

"These scouts put in hours of time cutting, sanding, polishing. They take time painting and decorating, weighing. It is an in-depth process of making these cars," Caballero said.

The event will begin at noon. The Family and Friends group will be the first to compete, with 13 competitors.

"The goal is to give everyone an opportunity to race. Friends or family of a Girl Scout can purchase a kit, which gives an opportunity for a brother, close friend or parent to be involved. These guests compete in the Family and Friends group," Caballero said.

Each group is split into heats of four in which the fastest two racers compete community donations this vear.

According to Beth. "We are highlighting our annual community giving program by encouraging both Scripps Ranch schools and local non-profit organizations to apply for donations that will fund their projects, aimed at better-

ing the community and creating a lasting impact."

Scripps Ranch schools are encouraged to apply for donations that can be allocated directly to core education areas, including math, language arts, history, science, reading, English, social studies, the arts, and STEM. Recent donations have funded STEM materials, reading resources, science lab supplies, and have supported our elementary schools, middle school, and Scripps


friends group.

Experience fresh Salvadoran food at the market

asty pupusas, crispy yuca with chicharrónes and sweet fried plantains. If you've never tried Salvadoran food, make a stop at the Scripps Ranch Farmer's Market on Thursdays and visit Glenda Hernandez, the owner of Your Salvadoran Kitchen, to sample some of this Salvadoran fare.

Hernandez has been serving up authentic Salvadoran comfort food at the market since March 2023, inviting locals to experience the rich flavors of her culture.

"It's a great community. Once people get to know you, they keep coming back," she said. "There are so many friendly people who ask about the food. I offer samples, and once they try it, they love it. I have regulars who come every week for pupusas, picking up extras for dinner and even lunch the next day."

Salvadoran cooking runs in the family for Hernandez.

"My mom founded the restaurant El Salvadoreño in 1995. It was the first of its kind in San Diego," she said. "Now, I'm doing the same

thing, but under my name, bringing our food to local markets."

Hernandez is working hard to introduce more people to Salvadoran cuisine.

"A lot of people don't know us yet, so I'm trying to get our name out there," she explained. "Our most popular dish is pupusas. They're like thick tortillas stuffed with delicious fillings like pork, cheese and beans."

Everything at her booth is made fresh to order, with her husband, Harvey, lending a hand behind the scenes.

"I bring a fridge and a salad bar-style table to prep everything fresh at the market, and Harvey helps me set it all up," she said.

Hernandez, 43, moved to the United States when she was just 8 years old, fleeing the war in El Salvador with her family.

"We came here because of the war, and my mom had a sister in San Diego," said Hernandez, who now lives in Logan Heights.

While she still helps out at her mother's restaurant from time to time, she's focused on growing her own business and introducing Salvadoran food to new communities.

"I want to expand and keep doing the farmer's markets as long as I can. Eventually, I'd love to open a brick-andmortar restaurant – maybe in Murrieta or Temecula – so more people outside of Latino communities can experience our food," she said. "Latinos know us, but once others try our dishes, they love them. I have customers who come back week after week to find me."

Carlsbad High and Clairemont High on Jan. 22 and Jan. 24, respectively.



After the game versus University City High this


Point Loma High and culminating with a 2-0 victory over Mission Bay High.


